- The 2017 Conference committee is already hard at work on a fabulous conference program to mark our diamond anniversary mark your calendars now for October 20 and 21, 2017.


Thanks to all of you for your hard work on behalf of our professions, and BCASLPA – I look forward to many conversations with you this year. Until next time,

UBC SASS UPDATE

Spotlight on new faculty of the UBC School of Audiology and Speech Sciences

Dr. Stacey Skoretz is a medical Speech-Language Pathologist and was recently appointed as Assistant Professor (tenure-track) with the School of Audiology and Speech Sciences in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of British Columbia (UBC) in Vancouver. She is also Assistant Clinical Professor with the Department of Critical Care in the Faculty of Medicine and Dentistry at the University of Alberta in Edmonton. She completed her doctoral training at the University of Toronto under the supervision of Dr. Rosemary Martino. Stacey's research program focuses on artificial airways and their impact on upper airway physiology with an emphasis on swallowing function following cardiovascular surgery, organ transplantation, and critical illness. She was awarded the Dysphagia Research Society New Investigator Award in 2012 for her work on dysphagia following cardiovascular surgery. For many years, she has worked and continues to work as a clinician in quaternary-level cardiovascular, neuroscience, and critical care units. This guides her work in the advancement of evidence-based practice in the field of swallowing and its disorders. She has been an invited speaker on many occasions throughout North America and lecturer at both the University of Alberta and the University of Toronto. In addition to conducting research in both British Columbia and Alberta, she will be teaching graduate-level courses in the areas of swallowing and motor speech at UBC-Vancouver.

Childhood Apraxia of Speech (CAS): Building Confidence in your Skills and Implications for Literacy

COMMUNICATION DISABILITIES ACCESS CANADA SURVEY



Communication Disabilities Access Canada (CDAC) was successful in getting a small grant to engage people with communication disabilities, speech-language pathologists, educators, and disability advocates to provide input on their communication access needs to the emerging federal government's accessibility legislation.

This is the first time that the federal government has recognized the need for input on accessibility from the communication disability sector and we must take the opportunity to have our needs known and embedded in the new law. To do that, we have developed a survey. The fast, multiple choice survey may take 10-15 minutes. There is the option to add examples and make suggestions. We need as many people as possible to complete the survey so that we can have a strong voice in the roll-out of the federal government's accessibility legislation.

Please share this survey with at least five other people—anyone who is interested in improving access to services for people with communication disabilities. We really need to bang the drum on this one! Numbers do matter.

INTERIM FEDERAL HEALTH PROGRAM (IFHP) POLICY ON COORDINATION OF BENEFITS

November 2016

This bulletin is to confirm that in accordance with the <u>IFHP Policy</u>, the IFHP is a payer of last resort, meaning that it provides benefits to those who lack public health insurance and comprehensive private health insurance.

The IFHP does not cover the cost of health-care services or products that a person may claim (even in part) under a public or private health insurance plan/program. The IFHP <u>does not</u> coordinate benefits with other insurance plans/programs therefore co-payments are not possible.
